In addition, each workshop will have a facilitator and recorder. Discussions and feedback from AAC 2014 will be included in these workshops. The workshop sessions will be grouped in separate rooms based on the main themes of the conference. The workshops will identify common priorities and recommend either building on AAC 2014 projects or new projects for seed funding application to AAUN partnership funds, matched by government and private sector funding. These proposed projects will be developed further and considered in a competitive call for bids towards the funding. The purpose of the workshop sessions is to integrate AABC and partners in an academia-business-government teamwork in order to close gap between business, research and policy makers and come up with proposed concrete outcomes in terms of policy recommendations and other project proposals.
